For 12 years now, the Bear River Historical Society has operated the Heritage Museum in the I.O.O.F. Memorial Hall, (owned by the Bear River Legion). That building is now being sold. The museum must move.

The heritage collection fills five rooms with antiques, artifacts and articles and that celebrate everything from Mi'kmaq traditional settlements of the 1500's to the Cherry Carnivals of the 1960's. Many residents of our village have only a passing awareness of this gem that displays our treasures, our pride *and* our potential. Tourists and visitors who view the collection leave glowing compliments about the museum and the rich history of our small community. During its summer season, the museum also employs young residents (students) of Bear River as hosts and interpreters.

The Bear River Historical Society has done all this on the strength of volunteer enthusiasm and commitment but it has reached a turning point. We need new energy ... and this means new volunteers. We must move the museum collection to continue operation. Arrangements are being made, funding being sought -- to renovate the Green Lantern Building (next to the Post Office) and make it the new Heritage Museum.

Think about it. History is not a just a dusty collection of dates, heirlooms, and creased photographs. It's what is happening all around us, all the time -- and we are part of it. The Tributary Newsletter (that you're reading right now) is produced by the Historical Society as a record for future generations to appreciate what went on before them.
